

Creationism Taught In Russia

About a year ago, I was encouraged by my friend, Doug Irwin, to join him on his mission trip to Perm, Russia. His suggestion was that I would present a series of lectures on the validity of the Biblical view of creation from a scientific standpoint to the people of Perm, Russia. I believe that God has provided for me the right preparation for such an undertaking. One blessing I have received in my training has been a hunger for learning and the ability to put that hunger to good use. A yearning to understand nature is as important as the actual knowledge.

Allow me to share with you a little personal history. How did I become an active creationist?

One of the most important experiences of my informal training came in 1974 when I was introduced to John Clayton's "Does God Exist" seminar in Cincinnati, Ohio. The next year I attended one of his weeklong training schools in South Bend, Indiana. Although I no longer agree with his stand on an old Universe, he provided valuable insight for my education concerning the scientific validity of creation and the problems with evolution.

Soon, I began to be exposed to creationist literature, starting with the Creation Research Society's

Journal. I was assigned to write a research paper in the required Evolution class, in graduate school. Amphibians were interesting to me, so I researched the literature about the evolution of amphibians. It didn't take long to discover a disturbing pattern as I did my research. Each journal report or section in a book would have a promising title about the evolution of this or that phase of amphibian evolution. The book section or article would proceed to present interesting and valuable information **without the slightest degree of evidence for evolution.** Then in the conclusions there would be some sort of *claim* that amphibian evolution had been demonstrated. The consistent problem I noticed was that, although the reports themselves usually provided

valuable information, they did not lend any support for a better understanding of the evolution of amphibians. By the way, this pattern remains today. Pick up any journal and you will see the pattern for yourself.

So, it was about 1975 that I became a skeptic of the validity of evolution as an explanation of anything. In 1987, I was invited by the youth minister at Grace Church in Harmony, Pennsylvania to teach a series of lessons on the problems with evolution and the scientific evidence for creation. I had been recommended to him because I was known for my skepticism of evolution, in my biology classes

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at Seneca Valley High School. Pete became a friend and he invited me to attend a meeting of a group that called itself, Creation Science Fellowship. The very first program I attended was about the Grand Canyon and the age of the earth. At that time I was an "old earth creationist" and taught the young people from that perspective. [I am now just a creationist who is old.] The speaker was a very articulate man who went by the name of Bob Walsh. Although I knew that he was wrong about the age of the earth, Creation Science Fellowship looked like they had something to offer. They were believers in the scientific accuracy of the Bible and they seemed to base their teachings on good science. A major service that CSF provided was their suggestion of some good books to read. I soon became an avid reader of creationist authors and was soon converted into a "young earth" creationist.

A giant leap in my preparations for the lectures in Perm, Russia came thanks to the three International Conferences On Creationism that I have had the opportunity to attend.

I understand that I am part of the body of Christ. It has been my joy to discover that I have usefulness in God's plan and that other vital parts of the *body of Christ* have other ways of being useful. What should I do? Check out Romans 11: 33-36! Therefore, I feel it is my mission to offer myself to be used of God. **What more exciting adventure could there be?!** What made it even better, is that I knew my own limitations, so I, more than anyone else, knew how inadequate I was for the job. **I felt good about heading into an adventure that I had to**

rely on God causing the success, plus He had called me to that adventure.

I have told you all of this to explain how I came to decide to share my understanding of nature with the people in Perm, Russia. My experience has been that many people have a good understanding of biology and several communicate well enough to pass on that knowledge. Many people have a good understanding of the arguments in favor of creation. But very few have the right combination to effectively present the needed message. Here I am at 54 years old and it seems like God has blessed me with the training, interest and abilities that few others have. I believe that we have a responsibility to use our gifts to God's glory as best we can. After much prayer I decided to allow God to make use of the training he has provided for me.

On July 12 I took off for Perm, Russia, along with my friend Doug and his daughter, Heather who is a Social Work major at Harding University. Doug made most of the arrangements for our trip. The first leg of the trip was the flight from Pittsburgh to New York. Those of you who fly a lot may tune out while I tell of my excitement with flying. We boarded a twin engine propeller American Airlines plane that turned out to be very noisy. The airplane flew fairly low so I could make out details on the ground but that also produced a very bumpy ride. We were treated to interesting views of: downtown Pittsburgh, the towns along the Allegheny near Pittsburgh, Indiana, Altoona, the New Jersey coast, and finally New York.

Of course I got some footage with my video camera. I can imagine the people on the plane thought I was a little strange, but I was on a big adventure and I wanted to share it when I got back home.

The lady from Connecticut that I sat next to was interested in my

mission and wished me well. Her husband was a preacher and she worked for a nature group that was trying to save "greenways" in New England.

My first touch with people who spoke with a Russian accent was at the Aeroflot check-in in New York. Not a real pleasant experience, but I do not want to be accused of being a John Rucker supporter, so I'll say no more!

Boarding the big Aeroflot jet was entering a new world for me. I was immediately immersed into a group of people who all spoke Russian and very few could speak any English. The information from the pilot during the flight was in Russian with just a little English interpretation. The lady I sat next to spoke no English but as I started video taping out the window, she made sure that she got the attention of the stewardess to ask if it was permissible to video tape during the flight. I got the "official OK".

With the excitement of new experiences and the noise of the airplane, I didn't get much sleep during the 10-hour flight. We took off in the **afternoon** from New York and were to **arrive the next morning** with only **10 hours** of flight time. Basically, I lost one night. One of the first interesting experiences of my trip happened just after the pilot had made a very gentle landing in Moscow. Most of the people in the plane broke out in applause. What a nice tradition. The customs check was uneventful and we met three people who had traveled by train from Perm to be our guides, translators, and luggage carriers. Nina, a college English teacher and her husband George, and a teenage boy named Shasha greeted us and helped us get our luggage to a VW bus that belonged to a relative of Nina. Our first destination was the train station where we took our luggage to be stored for easy access later.

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We then toured Moscow by VW bus. My first impression was that if anyone had aspirations of becoming a racecar driver, Moscow traffic would be an excellent training ground. Many of the old buildings were beautiful, especially the Orthodox churches. I never thought I would ever find myself walking in Red Square, the street where the Soviet May Day parade took place each year. I grew up seeing the annual parade with enemy soldiers, tanks, and missiles parading every May. I can still picture the Premier and other officials standing atop of buildings reviewing the parade. We even got to see the changing of the guard ceremony at the Russian tomb of their Unknown Soldier.

At one end of Red Square stands one of the most ornate buildings I have ever seen. St. Basil's cathedral has at least five of those onion spires that are typical of Orthodox churches. We get to tour the church that is now a museum. It is interesting that the entrance price for foreign visitors is as much as ten times higher than for Russian citizens in many of Russia's museums. Who said capitalism isn't catching on!

In late afternoon we were dropped off at the train station, we retrieved our luggage and started the long walk to the right train and our car. It was hot and I was wishing I had left half of my stuff at home.

Our train was the Kama, which travels daily between Moscow and Perm, which lies on the banks of the Kama River. The Kama train was our address for the next twenty hours as we crossed two time zones. I found the train ride very interesting. Each car had about ten compartments, with two bunk beds and a small table. There was a bathroom at each end of the car. A very smartly dressed conductress was in charge of each car. One of her more important jobs was to lock the bath-

rooms about ten minutes out of any of the dozen or so stations that we stopped at. You see, when you flush the toilet you can look down to see the ties of the track whizzing by.

Soon after we got underway, she brought our sheets and towels. If you wanted, she would also bring a teacup or a blanket. She later brought us a box lunch. Our conductress kept her car immaculately clean and tidy. At each stop she would open the steps so we could get off and stretch. Even before the train would come to a complete stop, people from the village would be hurrying to sell their goods to the passengers. They would offer vegetables from their gardens, fruits, homemade bread, various kinds of drinks, and ice cream. My favorites were fresh red raspberries and rolls that had mashed potatoes baked into their middles.

On the outskirts of the larger cities we would start seeing the minivillages where the city dwellers had their *duchas*. Most city dwellers in Russia live in large apartment buildings. Their apartments are very small and cramped for space. Some people own small plots of property called *duchas*, which are located in the countryside away from the city. Many were just a garden but others had very small two storied houses with steep roofs. They were grouped together as sort of minivillages with walls or fences around the perimeter. I learned that the people watch guard over their neighbor's *duchas*. I would say there were usually groupings of around 50-60 *duchas* in each minivillage. The minivillages were each located near the train station because very few people have access to a car. The Friday afternoon trains going away from the city and Sunday afternoon trains returning to the city were to be avoided. Sardines have more room! People could be seen each Sunday with buckets and backpacks filled with various fruits and vegetables walking to the trains and then trying

to board them for their trips back to the city.

Arrival in Perm

On arriving at the train station at Perm, my host, Valery Emakov, met me and helped me with my bags. We walked to the tram [streetcar], hoisted my luggage up into the tram car, traveled to the proper stop, and walked about 1/3 mile to his house. I was surprised with how hot it was; 90-92 degrees every day. Valery, his wife Luda, and children Linda, Dennis and Masha are one of the very few families who do not live in an apartment building. Valery, a former dentist is the preacher of the Church of Christ that meets in Perm.

Projector Problems

My mission was to present an eight part series of lessons to the people of Perm. Three lecture halls were located and rented by my friends in the Perm Church of Christ. Two halls were in large cultural buildings and the evening lectures were at the college of engineering. The morning and evening lectures were reached after 50 minutes of riding the tram, train and bus as well as much walking and were located at opposite ends of the city of Perm. The evening lectures had the best location, right in the center of downtown Perm.

I took an overhead projector, six extra bulbs [just in case], and overhead transparencies in English and Russian for the eight lectures. The lectures were scheduled to start on Monday, so on Saturday, previous to the start of the lectures, I wanted to scout out the three lecture halls. I had gone armed with a Radio Shack transformer to step down the voltage from 220 to 110 volts. It was supposed to be good up to 600 watts. At our first stop, the evening lecture hall, the projector worked fine and I was very satisfied with the facility.

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We then traveled to the cultural palace where the morning lectures were to be delivered. I blew two bulbs due to the high voltage. At the afternoon site I blew another. I didn't want to risk any more bulbs so on Monday morning at my first lecture in the Zakamsk part of Perm I was a little apprehensive. I plugged the projector into my trusted transformer, held my breath and eased the switch on.....and it blew out right away. Ok, that's four down and only three to go, to last for 24 lectures! Part one of *Neo-Darwinism Logically Impossible* was presented successfully without the use of the overhead transparencies I had poured so many hours into producing. About 30 people were in attendance and they seemed to be very interested in what I had to share. Several people took notes and they asked many questions. Success! I was pumped up and eager for the afternoon in the opposite end of Perm region at Molodezhnaya. At 2:30 in the afternoon the audience of 15 people was assembled in the big lecture hall. I plugged in the projector, with my now not so trusted "American" Radio Shack transformer, held my breath and eeeaaasseed on the switch and.....the bulb promptly blew! With apologies I delivered the lecture; again followed by good questions. A second success, but with 5 bulbs down with 2 left and 22 more lectures I was a little more than mildly concerned. My translator, Masha and I traveled back to Valery's house to rest up for the evening. My host, Valery was a very resourceful individual and loaned me a larger transformer that was made in China. I was relieved!

The evening lectures were, not only at a better time of day, but also a better location right in the center of a city of over one million people. Therefore, we anticipated a larger crowd. I was very pleased to have 55 people. I had been praying for

the people of Perm for a couple of months and I think God put in the minds of people to come to the lectures. I plugged my projector into Valery's transformer, held my breath and eased on the switch..... and the projector worked just fine! I was about ten minutes into my lecture when somebody alerted me to the sight of smoke pouring forth from Valery's, "made in China" transformer. I quickly pulled the plug to save the bulb and again with apologies proceeded with my lecture. As in the morning session, many took notes. After the program, the audience had plenty of excellent questions. The people seemed to be friendly; the need was certainly there, and I figured; I have nothing to loose, so I asked if anyone had a Russian made overhead projector or knew someone with one that I could use. [In retrospect, I personally believe that all of my difficulties of the day were in God's providence. Remind me to tell you why later, if I forget to tell you.] A very friendly looking man and woman came up afterwards and offered to bring a Russian overhead projector! Wow! We returned home rejoicing in a successful first day. People came and they were very obviously interested in what I had to offer them.

That night I was at Valery's home relaxing and to my surprise, Valery produced yet another transformer. This one was much larger, probably about 8 pounds and was Russian made! I slept very well the first night, despite the heat. **God had provided and He had used me that day.**

I have enjoyed telling you the story of my adventures in Perm, Russia so far. I hope some of you have enjoyed my travelogue so far. Due to the length of my tale I will let you rest until next month's Origin Insights. I realize that this report is a little out of the ordinary for CSF's newsletter but I know many of you were praying for me and the success of my mission trip so I

thought you would be interested in a detailed report. I'll continue next month so rest up.

THE PENNSYLVANIA DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION is in the final stages of establishing academic standards for science and technology. These standards include what students will be required to know about the theory of evolution. Once these standards pass the regulatory review process they will be required for all

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public schools in Pennsylvania.

They have just released a new revised version of these standards, dated July 12, 2000, and are now soliciting input from the public. I am now trying to get as many people as possible to mail or email suggestions to the State Board of Education.

The revised version is much better than the original draft which was horribly dogmatic. Yet one new standard is worded as though human evolution from early hominids is an accepted fact. It reads, "Examine human history by describing the progression from early hominids to modern humans."

I would prefer that the wording be changed to something like, "Critically evaluate the validity of the hominids that evolutionists claim to be ancestral to modern man."

Jan 99: "Developing the creation model for yourself" by Robert Walsh. A how-to-guide on doing Biblical creation studies at home and studying the Bible in general. Excellent resource and guide.

Feb 99: "The age of the earth. What does the Bible say?" by Robert Walsh and Don Schell. An in depth scripture study of two of the most popular compromise explanations for genesis account of origins given in the church. Learn about the day/age and

gap theories.

Mar 99: "Rocks around the clock" - Chuck Danley. What does the Bible say about the original created geology of the world and do any of those features remain on the earth today?

May 99: "The pre-flood world" - Robert Walsh and Henry Jackson. A close look at the Biblical descriptions of the pre-fall and pre-flood world in the areas of climate, geology, anthropology, and religion. A discussion of the zodiac and its relationship to the Bible is included in this lively presentation.

Jun 99: "Noah's Ark - Robert Walsh and Jeff Lawther. This presentation developed the Biblical framework regarding the Ark and Flood, examining the sequence and duration of Noah's Flood. The Biblical texts that discuss the sources of the Flood waters were examined along with the data provided for the Ark itself. Jeff and Bob examined some of the frequent questions that often arise when discussing Noah's Ark. These questions include (1) Was the Ark large enough to repopulate the world with all of the know extinct and extant creatures?; (2) How could fresh and salt water fish exist in the same ocean?; (3) Was Noah's Flood local or global in extent?; (4) If the Ark existed, could it be

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sea worthy? (5) How could Noah feed and care for all of the required animals while on the Ark?; and more...

Aug 99: "The Dead Speak" - Dennis E. Wert. This talk examined the effect of the flood on living things. In particular, what was the impact of the world wide flood of Noah on all the living creatures on the earth at the time of that flood. We looked at the questions of evidences for the flood in the fossil record and effect of the flood on the survival of the animals taken on the ark and those that were not taken. This lively talk had a number of good questions and answers at the end.

SEP 99: "Should Creationism be Taught in Public Schools?" This presentation is done by Robert Walsh at a local secular political "think tank" meeting. It defines and examines the issues involved and clears of the confusion that clouds this topic. It attacks the assumption that evolution is science and creation is religion and clearly differentiates what science can say about how the universe operates versus what they "believe" about how the universe came to be.

NOV 99: "Creation: What's All the Fuss" is the topic of **Bob Walsh's** talk at this monthly meeting. His emphasis is on the effect of "compromise" efforts by the Church have had on its effectiveness and doctrine. He clearly shows how the doctrine of creation affects all aspects of

Christian Doctrine and Practice. The destructive effect on the Christian view of marriage and the family is also discussed. The very basis of our political founding documents rest on the fact of the creation of man by God.

JAN 2000: "Philosophical and Logical Evidences for Creation" by Dr. Stephen Rodabaugh. This talk investigates the basis and consequences of a persons worldview" or guiding philosophy on not only what they think but how they act. Dr. Rodabaugh points out the moral bankruptcy of the evolutionary philosophy and the superiority of life from a creationist perspective..

APR 2000: "Living Things As Evidence for Creation". This presentation was done by Dennis Wert and seeks to compare and contrast the views of life - including mankind - as seen from an evolutionary and creationist perspective. The more explanatory and scientifically valid theory of why living things look the same as well as different is shown to be creationism. Its logical and satisfying elements better describe not only what we see but how living things came to be as they appear today. This is short and BASIC introductory talk suitable for 6th grade and up.

MAY 2000: "Geologic Evidences for Creation and the Flood" by Chuck Danley. Chuck gives an overview of the geologic evidences for the creation of the earth and the worldwide flood of Noah. In this talk he compares

and contrasts the evidences as described by evolutionary geology with the better explanation of a fiat creation and the sedimentary effects of a global flood. A must hear talk on basic creationist geology.

JUN 2000: "Evidences for a Young Earth" presented by Jeff Lawther. Jeff first examines the issue of, Does a young earth position matter to the origin's debate and the church. His reasons will clearly demonstrate the necessity of affirming the Biblical young earth model. Then Jeff moves on to cite the physical evidences for a young age for the earth and the universe: decay of the earth's magnetic field, decay of comets, seafloor sediments, out of sequence fossils, polystrate fossils, helium in the atmosphere, abrupt appearance of history and society, radio halos of Polonium 210, population of the earth, and the recession of the moon. This is another excellent overview, introductory talk on the basics of these evidence for a recent creation.

JUL 2000: "Chinese Pictographs and Creation." Reid Moon presents evidence of the antiquity and shared nature of the Genesis account of creation, the flood and Tower of Babel as found in the pictographs of the Chinese language. His presentation looked at the language and the elements of various words that demonstrate not only the monotheistic history of China

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but also attest to a knowledge of the events recorded in the first 11 chapters of the book of Genesis. You will be fascinated of truths that make up words like: man, to create, garden, and boat.

AUG 2000: "Fossil Evidence for the Flood" by Bob Ivey.


Bob presents some basic information on what fossils are and what the term "fossil record" means to geologists. He examines how information formerly cited as supporting evolution better supports the catastrophic flood model found in the book of Genesis. He discusses fossils positions and succession as well as why the lack of human fossil evidence in the rocks. He discusses how even some modern evolutionary geologists suggest catastrophic event(s) for the formation of these large fossil remains.


